# How to plan my course pattern?

## General Tips

- Remember to refer to the “Recommended Course Pattern” in the 2024-25 Study Scheme and familiarize yourself with the compulsory courses
- Ask for senior students’ opinion and get extra information
- Consult your academic advisor and find a comfortable pattern
- Consider if you will take a minor study and have to reserve time for minor courses
- Consider if you will apply for Leave of Absence to join Co-op/Exchange programme in year three: you may need to take more credits before that

'Passing 3 Reaching 4'



- **GPA < 1.5**

Student shall be put on **academic probation**, a maximum of 12 units per term during first probation, and a maximum of 9 units per term during extended probation.



- **GPA < 1.0** (for 2 consecutive terms); *or*  
**Fails > half** of the units of courses (for 2 consecutive terms); *or*  
**GPA < 1.0** or **Fails > half** of the units of courses taken in a term, fails to obtain permission from the Major Programme concerned to continue studies; *or*  
**Fails to have probation lifted** after being on academic probation for 2 consecutive terms;

Student shall be required to **discontinue studies**.

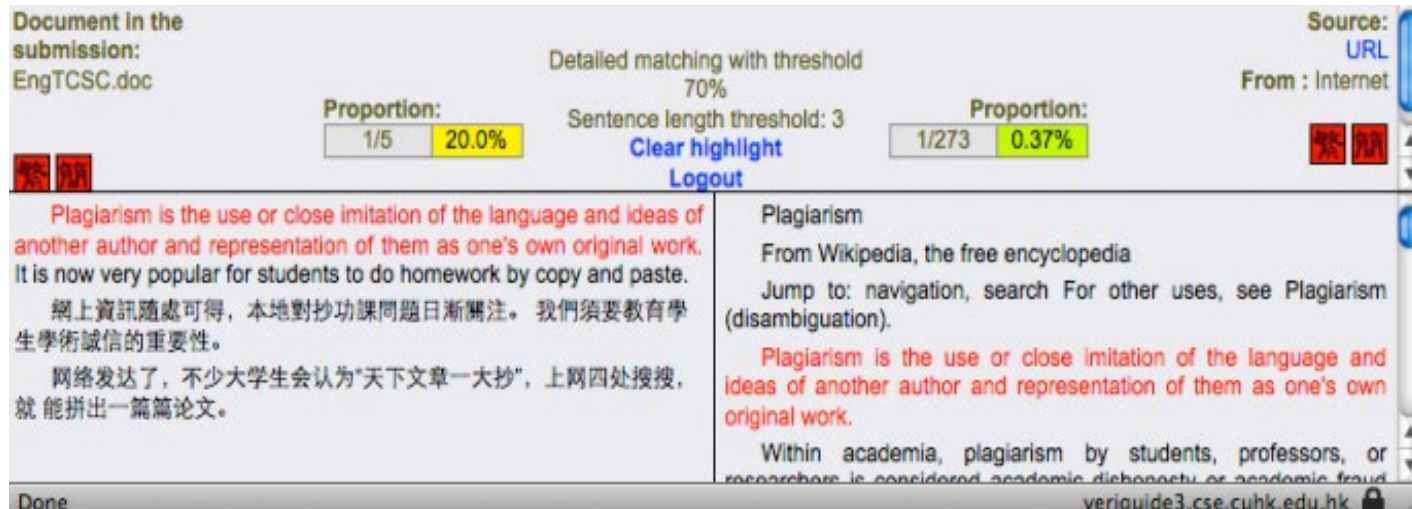

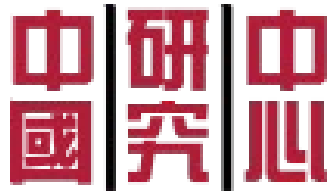
